## **Highlights**

Selected Labour Force Indicators

- Labour force participation rate is 53.4% for the First Quarter of 2014.
- Unemployment for the survey period is 4.1%.

Sri Lanka Labour Force Survey (LFS) is designed to measure the levels and trends of employment, unemployment and labour force in Sri Lanka. LFS has been conducted quarterly, since the first quarter of 1990.

The field work of the survey for the first quarter of 2014 was done in January, February and March covering the whole country.


Table 3 provides the information on LFPRs since year 2008. Referring the table 3, It is important to note that, male participation to the labour force is always higher than that of females.

According to the Table 1, the estimated economically active population is about 8.8 million in the first quarter 2014. Of which 64.5 percent are males and 35.5 percent are females. Out of the economically inactive population 25.4 percent are males and 74.6 percent are females (Table 2).

Considering the Table 4, the distribution of LFPR by age group and by gender depicts high male participation compared to female in all age groups. The highest overall participation rate, as well as the highest participation rates for male and female are reported for the age group of 40–44 years.

This also includes persons with a job but not at work during the reference period




Figure 2 : Distribution of employed population by employment status and Agriculture/Non-Agriculture sector-First Quarter 2014

Table 5 shows the percentage distribution of employed population by main industry from first quarter 2013 to first quarter 2014. During first quarter of 2014, the total number of employed persons in Sri Lanka is 12. Activities of households as employers; estimated as about 8.4 million. Of which, about 45.7 percent engaged in Services sector, 27.8 percent in Industries sector and 26.4 percent in Agriculture sector. The decline in the total employment and the change 13. Real estate activities (L) Arts, enterin percentage share of employment by industry between 2013 Q1 & 2014 Q1 could be attributed to the labour movement due to climatic variations (prevailed drought). Specially some part of unpaid family workers might become economically inactive.

Table 7 depicts the percentage distribution of male and female employed population by main industries. Regardless of the gender, the highest employment concentrated in service sector. Further among employed women 29.4 percent is in agriculture sector while this share is 24.8 percent for males.


According to Table 6, more employers are in non -agriculture sector than in agriculture sector. But contributing family workers are highly concentrated in agriculture sector.

The number of unemployed persons is estimated as about 362,000 during the first quarter 2014. The unemployment rate for the first quarter 2014 is 4.1 percent.




Figure 3 : Unemployment rate by age group and gender — First Quarter 2014

As shown in figure 3, it is very important to note that, when sampling error¹ is considered there are no statistically significant drops/increases of unemployment rates reported in different time periods starting from fourth quarter 2012 to first quarter 2014.

## Unemployed ...

As can be seen from table 8, overall unemployment rate reported for female is 6.1 percent and it is 3.0 percent for male. Youth unemployment rate 15 – 24 years reported for first quarter 2014 is 19.6 percent and that reported the highest unemployment rate among age groups. These rates for both males and females are 15.4 and 27.3 percent respectively.

Further the survey results revealed that the unemployment among females is higher than that of males, in all age groups.

The highest unemployment rate is reported from the G.C.E (A/L) and above group which is about 6.9 percent. Corresponding percentages are 3.6 percent and 10.3 percent for males and females respectively. Among males highest unemployment rate is reported

from GCE (O/L) category.

This shows that the problem of unemployment is more acute in the case of educated females than educated males .




Figure 4: Unemployment rate by level of education and gender – First Quarter 2014
